

**Playing the Queen  
Using The Chess Pieces Of Your Life  
Learning Strategies For Better Communications**

- \* **Organizing** your thoughts and dialogue after critical and selective thinking.
- \* **The goal** is a hopeful and peaceful encounter.

**Romans 15:13** Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope, through the power of the Holy Ghost.

**Pawns** (8 pieces) Pawn. ...(Feelings and casual thoughts). The pawns, as you know, are the only pieces to stand in the front row and there are more of them than any other pieces on the board. The pawns represent the serfs, or peasants, who had to pay money to live on the king's land. These can be sacrificed and used to test the waters and positions of an opponent.

**Rooks** (2 pieces) There are two rooks in a set of chess pieces. .. The rooks represent the castle's walls, which protect the king, queen, bishop, and knights. It is important to have walls of protection and boundaries that will protect the other pieces. Always put boundaries up before the confrontation.

**Knights** (2 pieces) There are two knights in every team in chess. . The knight move is unusual among chess pieces. It moves to a square that is two squares away horizontally and one square vertically, or two squares vertically and one square horizontally. ... Unlike all other standard chess pieces, the knight can "jump over" all other pieces (of either color) to its destination square...Taking action in an engaging conversation may require jumping past both players talking points when it is a sensitive and vain attempt to communicate.

**Bishops** (2 pieces) The bishops are also known as the camels. ... A player possessing a pair of bishops has a strategic weapon in the form of a long-term threat to trade down to an advantageous endgame. Two bishops and king can force checkmate against a lone king, whereas two knights cannot. A bishop and knight can force checkmate, but with far greater difficulty than two bishops. As the game proceeds this piece can be in reserve for great influence with accuracy and must be protected just like the closing thoughts in your communications.

**Queen** (1 piece) The Queen is the second-most tallest piece in the whole set. ...The queen is like the main theme in a person's heart and can keep the mind sound with pure motivation. It can move in all directions and cover all topics but it cannot be exposed until the very end because it will defend the person's soul.

**King** (1 piece) The King is a persons soul. Make no mistake the enemy will try and take it. It's movement is limited and it depends on all the other pieces to defend it and protect it. In a conversation you will be ultimately judged by game rules. Learning the rules and the strategies will give you a hopeful and peaceful encounter.

The Bible tells us to guard our hearts and mind. Phil. 4:6-7 Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.

I like to think of our heart, mind and soul as the Queen piece in a chess set. The most valuable player has to be guarded and protected. All moves in life are about engaging just the right chess piece for the assault. Our hearts are the driving force and essence of our being.
